



The Teacher Feature Starring Chuck Dill

Ummm—white hair, white beard. Could it be? Gentle spirit, generous heart. It must be! Who would have guessed that the Neighborhood Art House has its very own Santa Claus day in and day out? Chuck Dill doesn't wear the traditional red suit but he does indeed share some of the basic qualities that make a good Santa Claus, not least among them being a consistent effort to provide the best for the children in his care.

Dill is an Erie native and a graduate of McDowell High School. He began his life as an artist while a teenager when he worked as a designer for a local contractor. Throughout the years Dill has enjoyed every aspect of being an artist, from creating whimsical fiberglass characters to restoring damaged church statuary. His work has been featured at public arts projects in Erie (*Leap Frog and Go Fish*), Pittsburgh, and Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, as well as in Cleveland and Youngstown, Ohio. Most recently his carved slate sculpture, entitled "Spoken," was on display at Gannon University in connection with the 2008 Festival of the Arts.

A teacher at the Neighborhood Art House for more than six years, Dill has taught a variety of courses including free-

form sculpture, air brushing, computer imaging, and digital photography and recently introduced new courses in screen printing and wood burning. He readily admits that this is his favorite job: "A friend recommended it to me so I volunteered," said Dill. "I knew from that first day I wanted to be here, to teach here. I love seeing creativity develop in young people."
